Oldham in Profile - Population



Population:

- Mid-year population estimates for England and Wales are produced annually by the office for national statistics (ONS).
- According to the 2024 mid-year population estimates, the usual resident population of Oldham is approximately 251,560. An increase of 1.4% since the 2023 mid-year population estimates.
- By Broad Age Bands we can see that Oldham has a significantly younger population than both GM and England.
- The population pyramid shows a significantly younger population within Oldham. There is a greater number of younger males and older females.




Oldham Age Structure - Population Mid Year Estimates ONS














Oldham in Profile - Ethnicity



Population:

- Oldham has seen considerable change in different ethnic groups since the 2001 census. The proportion identifying as white British was 84.4% in 2001 and is now 65.2% in 2021. During the same time period there has been significant growth from the Pakistani and Bangladeshi communities
- The school census shows that 48.5% of those aged between 4-15 are white British, 18.9% Pakistani, 12% Bangladeshi, 11.2% Mixed or other. 6.6% Black and 2.8% are other White.
- The make-up of Oldham's population will continue to change and become more diverse over the coming years as demonstrated by the differences in the proportions of each ethnic group between the 2021 Census and the school census.


Ethnic Group Change Over Time - ONS Census 2001,2011 and 2021.


School Age Ethnicity - Oldham council school Census











Oldham in Profile - Education



Education:

- Oldham is home to a wide variety of educational institutions such as primary and secondary schools. There remains several challenges within education in Oldham such as absence and educational attainment.
- Good level of development has been historically below both England and statistical neighbours, the latest data shows slight improvements for Oldham with Oldham now in line with statistical neighbours at 63.6%.
- Oldham has also had historically low results for KS2 expected standard below both England and statistical neighbours at 55%. This still remains a significant challenge for Oldham.
- Attainment 8 results have also been lower in recent years than both England and statistical neighbours. There was an increase shortly after COVID due to the use of TAG's but this has now returned to pre-COVID levels.
- Both no qualifications and level 4+ qualifications are significantly lower than than GM and England.



















Oldham in Profile - Economy



Economy:

- Oldham's economy was historically built upon manufacturing, large scale deindustrialisation means Oldham's economy has seen a significant restructure.
- Industry percentages show 17.9% of Oldham's workforce is in Health compared to 14.1% and 13.5% for GM and England respectively. Oldham also sees a greater proportion working in Manufacturing and Education compared to GM and England.
- Oldham also has a greater reliance on public sector employment at 23.5% compared to GM (19.2%) and England (17.5%)
- The latest data for the number of businesses shows Oldham has 8,425 businesses employing 84,000 people.



















Oldham in Profile - Economy



Economy:

- Median Household Income in Oldham has been historically low especially when compared to GM and the UK. The latest figure for Oldham is £32,662 which is lower than both GM and the UK. There are large discrepancies for median household income in Oldham across the different wards.
- Oldham's unemployment rate is currently 7.0% and this is the highest rate across Greater Manchester, Oldham's youth unemployment rate is also the highest across GM at 9.2%. Oldham consistently has a higher rate of unemployment than all other Greater Manchester local authorities.
- Oldham's NEET rate is the 2nd highest when compared to statistical neighbours. This is a measure that can fluctuate quite significantly due to the nature of the small sample sizes.

















Oldham in Profile - Housing



Housing:


- Housing is a significant challenge currently within Oldham and across the country. The borough has an unbalanced housing market with a low proportion of detached properties and a very high proportion of terraced properties.
- There has been a significant increase in median house price over the last few years within Oldham with an increase of 38.7% for all property types since 2020. This is greater than the national change of 16.9% over the same time period.
- Compared to statistical neighbours, Oldham sits in the middle of the pack at £190,000. Dudley has the highest median house price at £224,000 and Blackburn with Darwen has the lowest median house price at £144,000.

Oldham in Profile - Housing



Housing:

- Housing is a significant challenge currently within Oldham and across the country. The borough has an unbalanced housing market with a low proportion of detached properties and a very high proportion of terraced properties.
- The number of households and children in temporary accommodation has steadily increased since 2023 with highs of 722 and 793 respectively in September 2024.
- There has been a significant change in the proportion of households that are now privately rented going from 6% in 2001 to 18% in 2021.
- There has been very little change in terms of household dwelling type in Oldham, the proportion of terraced houses has decreased from 41% in 2001 to 38% in 2021 with a slight increase in the proportion of semi-detached houses going from 34% in 2001 to 36% in 2021.


















Oldham in Profile - Health




Health:


- In general, Oldham residents have worse health than England's average. There are strong links between deprivation and health outcomes and high levels of deprivation in the borough have a significant impact on health.
- Male life expectancy is around 3 to 4 years less than female life expectancy. There are also significant differences within Oldham in regards to life expectancy. Those living in the most deprived ward of Oldham (Alexandra) can expect to live shorter lives than those living in the most affluent ward of Oldham (Saddleworth South).
- The proportion of reception children in Oldham classed as overweight/obese is in line with statistical neighbours and England, however Oldham has a greater proportion of children in year 6 classified as overweight/obese.
- Smoking rates have decreased nationally and within Oldham consistently. Oldham currently ranks as the 3rd lowest local authority when compared to its statistical neighbours.
- Oldham ranks as the 3rd lowest local authority for physically active adults just ahead of Blackburn with Darwen and Walsall and is significantly below the national average (67.4%)

















Oldham in Profile - Deprivation



Deprivation:

- IMD (Indices of multiple deprivation) measures relative, not absolute deprivation. Analysis shows that Oldham's overall ranking has declined from 34th to 19th worst of 317 local authorities. (EXTRA BULLET ON DEPRIVATION and INEQUALITIES WITHIN OLDHAM)
- The proportion of households in Oldham that are classed as fuel poor is 12.8%. This is lower than most statistical neighbours with only Rochdale, Bolton and Tameside having a smaller proportion of households classed as fuel poor.
- Oldham has a particularly high rate of relative child poverty at 42.9%. This is only behind Bradford at 44.2%.
